Transition Process

- A transition IEP meeting will be held at your child's base school sometime soon.
- Either myself or another teacher from Rocky Run will attend the meeting in order to learn more about your child and to help make decisions regarding placement.
- Several different levels of service are provided at Middle school.
- Several types of support electives are available to students with/without IEP's
- Placement decisions can always be changed through the IEP addendum process.

Types of Special Education Support

<u>Special Education Support in a General Education Setting:</u> Large class size (25-30) Class is team taught by a Gen Ed teacher with Special Education support. Fast paced and grade level content

<u>Special Education/Small group setting</u>: Small class size, taught by a special educator and most of the time and IA. Grade level content. More modifications and reteaching opportunities.

Support through Strategies for Success Class or other Elective

Support During Rock Time

Reading 7

Year long course

The reading 7 student needs intense decoding and comprehension intervention. This student has been receiving regular reading intervention in elementary school. The Reading 7 student has most likely not passed a Reading SOL.



LAP (Formerly Read 180)

Year long course

The LAP student has basic decoding skills but still struggles with comprehension. This student is reading two or more years below grade level according to DRA2 scores on either fiction or non-fiction. The Read 180 student has also most likely not passed or barely passed Reading SOLs.



Action Literacy 7

One semester

The Action Literacy student is one grade level behind according to DRA2 scores. This students may have strong comprehension with fiction but not nonfiction, or vise versa. This is not a student who reads at home or has much practice with reading. The Action Literacy students has SOL scores that are possibly passing but 420 or below.

Power Math

Year long

This students has not been successful on Math SOLs, is lacking foundational skills, or is possibly a English Language Learner (Levels 4-6). This students has a 420 or below on most past Math SOLs.

Strategies For Success

Year long elective mostly for students in Team Taught/ AA Classes

Focuses on teaching students both organization and skills.

 Some time is given for completing assignments and studying for tests, however, it is NOT study hall.

Personal Development

- Designed for students requiring direct instruction and support with social skills
- Taught by a special education teacher with the support of clinical staff
- Students have the opportunity to learn appropriate behaviors and practice them with peers under the guidance of a teacher
- Counts as four hours of special education support in a special education setting
