Tips for spotting fake news

Can't figure out what's true and what's fake? This is an infographic on how to compare true and fake news and find the difference so next time you won't be tricked into believing fake news.

Fact Check

Look at other resources to check if they also have the same information. If many websites do, then it is most likely reliable.

Look for Bias

If the information is biased or one-sided then it is most likely not true. If it does not talk about the other side's information, it is not realiable.

Examine the Dates

Examine the date to see if the article is old. If the article was not posted recently, it is not up-to-date on the new information. It is not reliable because the information old

Research the Author

Find the author and research him/her. If the author is a well-known reporter or nonfiction writer than it is reliable. However, some authors are comedians and they put fake information. Some authors also write scam articles and messages.

Look at the Link

Check the link to see if it is a well-known, educational site. For ex. 'history.com' or 'cnn.com'. If the site link seems suspicious then do not trust the site and it's information. For ex. 'realnewsrightnow.com' or 'abcnew.com.co'

Use your Gut

If it seems fake or unreal, best thing to do is to not trust it. Avoid researching things that are supernatural or weird. If it seems fake then just stay away from that kind of information.
